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**COLLEGE CONTRACTS WITH  
 OUTSIDE COMPANY TO OFFER  
 “VISUAL BASIC SCRIPTING

The College has retained Cullina and Company as an independent contractor “to provide informational technology training services.” Among the duties of Cullina and Company will be “to provide highly skilled, experienced, and credentialed instructors (subject to the College’s approval) to deliver . . . “Visual Basic Scripting Essentials.” The contract with Cullina makes clear that the teachers to be hired by the company are not to be considered College employees.

According to CCP faculty in the College's Computer Information Systems (CIS) Department, visual basic scripting is covered in CIS 106, 116, and 216, courses in computer programming offered by the Department. According to CIS faculty, enrollment in CIS courses is declining.

The company will use the College's IT staff in offering the courses. Also part of the contract is a provision that the company should "work with the College's IT Services department to ensure that they have all the information they need to set up the hardware and software for the courses; to test the setup to ensure its proper functioning; and to work with IT services to resolve any functional problems."

The College will pay Cullina and Co. a fee of \$1200 for each 12-hour course. Minimum class size is 6; maximum class size is 16. Students will be provided with books needed in the course. The contract spans the period October 26, 2005 through June 30, 2006.

The contractual arrangement with Cullina is a violation of both the FT and PT/VL contracts in a number of ways including:

- instructional services offered by the College must be offered by CCP faculty;
- faculty must be compensated in accordance with contractual provisions on salary and benefits; and
- CCP faculty are responsible for the course content in college offerings.

The Federation has filed a grievance including a request for information that asks the following questions:

- Who are the prospective students for these courses? What is the expected enrollment?
- What forms do students use to register for these courses?
- What will the students pay in tuition and fees?
- Why is the College paying for the students' books?
- What materials will the students be using? The Federation requests copies of the materials that will be given to the students.
- Where are the courses to be taught?
- Why is the class size being set at from 6 to 16 students?
- Is the College planning to request FTE reimbursement from the state for the students in these courses?
- Has the College's CIS Department been contacted in order to provide faculty to teach these courses?
- If so, why are these courses not being offered first to full-time and part-time faculty at the College?

A grievance hearing will be scheduled soon in this case. ■



**HIGHLIGHTS OF  
REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL**

At its meeting on **December 6, 2005**, the Representative Council

- accepted a report on the Federation Election from the Federation's Elections Committee;
- approved the Federation's Budget for 2005-2006;
- accepted the Audit of the Federation's books, and also the Fair Share Audit, which described which Federation expenses are chargeable to Fair Share Fee payers;
- set the Fair Share percentage for 2006 at 86.25% (according to the Fair Share Audit, the actual amount is 86.52%);
- approved a motion to continue to have refreshments at Representative Council meetings similar to those provided at the December 6, 2005, meeting;
- voted to allot Federation released time for Spring 2006 as follows: three sections for Karen Schermerhorn, Co-President; two sections for John Majewicz, Treasurer; and one section for each of the following: John Braxton, Co-President; Ruth Baker, Secretary; Frank Bartell and Pascal Scoles, Co-Chairs of the FT Unit; Mark Kimmelman and Ken Moberg, Co-Chairs of the PT/VL Unit; Jim Cochran, Grievance Chair; and two sections of extended time to Denis Michalski and Cynthia Reid, Co-Chairs of the CE Unit;
- voted to co-sponsor the Pa. AFL-CIO Scholarship and to contribute \$250 toward the scholarship;
- voted to contribute \$100 to Temple Urban Archives in appreciation of the Archives' accepting Federation files;
- approved a motion asking the College administration to cosponsor, on Professional Development Day, a forum for all faculty (FT, VL, PT) in which writers of the two General Education proposals explain the proposals; and agreeing to aid in implementing a vote on these proposals by all faculty, should the faculty decide to poll itself in order to inform the Standing Committees and IWC of faculty opinion on the proposals; and
- accepted the tally of responses to the Federation questionnaire on reasons for the enrollment drop in Fall 2005, with the amendment that the Co-Presidents meet with the CE Co-Chairs to gather their input on the matter before meeting with President Curtis to discuss the questionnaire responses. ■

composed of FTs who are current officers or who were on the last Negotiating Team, and those choices were ratified by a vote at the meeting. In identifying the eleven, the FT Caucus sought to bring in a diversity of disciplines as well as a broad spectrum of views on the salary schedule.

The Team Members include all four of the current general officers (Braxton, Schermerhorn, Majewicz, Baker) plus the two FT Faculty Co-Chairs (Bartell and Scoles).

Six of the eleven were on the last FT Faculty Team (Goldberg, Jacobson, Jones, Majewicz, Schermerhorn, Stephens) while five are newcomers (Baker, Bartell, Braxton, Scoles, Weinberg). However, in a broader sense Braxton is not new as he previously served on three PT/VL Teams. The longest-serving member is Goldberg, who has been on every Negotiating Team since the union's beginning in 1970.

Two members of the last FT Team will not serve this time: Bruce Watson, who retired in 2003, and Richard Keiser, who will be on sabbatical. ■

**RALLY BY THE UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA  
GRADUATE ASSISTANTS (GET-UP) DRAWS WIDE SUPPORT**

The organization GET-UP (Graduate Employees Together—University of Pennsylvania) held a large rally on December 8 at College Hall, the main administrative building on the University campus. Preceding the rally was a march from 40<sup>th</sup> and Locust Streets through the center of campus to College Hall. Our Co-President, John Braxton, participated in the march and spoke at the rally.

As the event coincided with an AFT Conference in Philadelphia, several dozen Conference delegates came over to Penn and enthusiastically joined in the march. More generally, this rally was one of many International Human Rights Day events throughout the United States which focused on workers' rights. GET-UP has a close connection with our union, not only because a number of our members have been involved in their events, but also because of the intrinsic similarity between the issues of Graduate Assistants and those of part-time faculty, particularly given that so many GAs teach part-time at area Colleges and Universities, including CCP.

GET-UP won a major victory in 2000, when the National Labor Relations Board ruled that graduate assistants across the country had a right to unionize. However, the composition of the NLRB changed with the arrival of George W. Bush in the White House, and the Labor Board reversed itself in 2005, dealing a setback to all graduate assistants' union activity at private universities. [See the article below on New York University.] Because of the Labor Board's reversal, the results of GET-UP's representation election, which was almost certainly won by the union, was never tallied and the ballots were sealed.

Since the negative ruling, GET-UP has still continued to function as it had, continually pressing the University administration to negotiate with the Graduate Assistants. Clearly, the struggle is not over. ■

**STRIKING GRADUATE EMPLOYEES  
AT NEW YORK UNIVERSITY NEED YOUR SUPPORT**

As you may have read, New York University has taken the opportunity of a 2005 NLRB ruling (that graduate employees at private universities do not have the right to organize a union) to withdraw recognition from the graduate employees' union at New York University, UAW Local 2110. As a result, the graduate employees have been on strike since November 9. Now, the President of the University, John Sexton, is threatening to fire all of the strikers and permanently replace them if they do not return to work.

To support the graduate employees, a group of full-time faculty at NYU has formed an organization, "NYU Faculty Democracy." In a message to NYU President Sexton, they condemned the "policy decisions taken by the President and the Provost regarding punishment for striking GA's . . . . They are clear encroachments on the domain of faculty governance." The group has also committed to withhold grades, implement a moratorium on the graduate admissions process, and inform prospective faculty members of "the administration's persistent violations of faculty rights . . ."

We can help:

1. If you know full-time faculty at NYU, urge them to join Faculty Democracy or congratulate them if they are already part of it.
2. Write to John Sexton (70 Washington Square, New York, NY 10012) and/or email ([john.sexton@nyu.edu](mailto:john.sexton@nyu.edu)) to demand that he withdraw his threat to permanently replace the workers; recognize their union; and bargain a just and fair contract. If you are an alumnus/alumna of NYU, write to President Sexton and tell him that you, as an NYU graduate, strongly oppose his policies.
3. Use the link below to sign the online petition to John Sexton from faculty across the country.

The struggle of these graduate students at NYU is part of a nation-wide struggle by faculty and graduate students to retain control over their profession.

Those who fail to make such confirmation prior to the first Representative Council meeting of the spring semester will be removed from the list of representatives and alternates.

**Note:** Where a department is entitled to more than one representative, representatives are listed in alphabetical order by last name but, where applicable, alternates are listed in descending order by number of votes received. Numbers of votes received are listed when there is more than one alternate.
